St. Andrew's United Church

Sunday, January 26, 2020

St. Andrew's United Church Annual Congregational Meeting was held in the sanctuary on Sunday, January 26, 2020 following a soup luncheon offered by the Outreach Team. There were 51 in attendance. See list attached. Jane Wilkinson took the minutes.

Reverend Dave Holmes

Well, what a year this has been – and I haven't even been here for a full year yet! As I contemplate my first annual report here at St. Andrew's, these are some of the things I'm thinking of.

First, gratitude. Karen and I are *so* glad to find ourselves here in Lacombe, and here at St. Andrew's! Having been in Calgary for almost 30 years, I did not anticipate being out of the "big city," but it was definitely time and we are delighted to be here. The fit here at the church feels great, and the location is turning out to be wonderful for our family. The only fly in the ointment is that we're slightly more than an hour further away from our grandkids... but that's still pretty close. We are very, very thankful!

Visiting. After three decades of city ministry, I must say I have not been a "visiting minister" for a long time. However, I resolved to change that here at St. Andrew's, and I have been spending a significant time since I started visiting congregants. It's been delightful! And I think it's also an important way to personalize the ministry here, and to keep me in touch with what's really going on for you. I also hope, as time goes on, to visit with people beyond the church as well – community leaders, potential ministry partners, and so forth. Thank you to those who have been organizing these visits for me – It began with Karen Yakimishyn, and lately it's been mostly Monique Vermegen. Going forward, I will also be depending on your invitations. If there's something going on that you want to discuss, if I simply haven't been by (at all, or for too long), please give me a call (or call Jana at the office) and invite me for a visit. Don't worry that I might be too busy; I'll let you know if I am (and I don't intend to be too busy for this).

Conflict. I'm aware that there has been some significant conflict here at St. Andrew's over the past few years; it's part of why I'm here, I think! I have heard a certain amount about this as I've been talking to people. I want to say *I'm not worried about this*, though I think it has significance for us. I'm aware that it has been painful – very painful, for some. I'm sorry about that, and I certainly don't want us to repeat this kind of hurtful conflict. I do think there have been some very important learnings for us, and the conflict, though difficult, may help us in the long run. Part of my work has been, and will continue to be, to help us "argue for the sake of heaven" – conduct our conflict in constructive ways so that our relationships are deepened not broken, and so that our disagreements may help our discernment, and add to our wisdom, rather than stalling our progress.

Advent. One of the things I've tried to do in a number of congregations I've served is to plan a season of the church year collectively, so that as many as possible of the church's programs and events tie into a single theme. I think this helps to pull us together, it deepens our experience of a theme and a season, and it can energize us as well. We tried this here during Advent, as we looked at "Finding God in the Dark." My experience of this is a good example of what I am appreciating about being part of St. Andrew's! I found people – some from the committees, and some from the wider congregation who just jumped in out of interest – were happy to contribute, readily took leadership, and then did amazing things with the programs and events they were developing. *This church is full of amazing and talented leaders!* Even through Zoom meetings

and restrictions on gatherings and stretches of extreme cold, the Advent team pulled together a number of great events and programs, to which both church and community responded with enthusiasm. Wow!

Looking ahead to 2022. I certainly hope that we'll be back, sometime hopefully early this year, to a more normal in-person church experience – including coffee and meals together! I look forward to the renewal of some of our cherished programs, like Messy Church and other in-person programs for children and families. I am aware, though, that we will be looking to find a *new* normal, and that there will be some shifts and changes brought about by changing circumstances and new opportunities. To that end, I think that 2022 will bring some discussions about the mission to which we are called together. I know you've had these discussions before – and we'll definitely build on what you've already done. But in these days of rapid change, this kind of conversation needs to happen in an ongoing way. Given the recent conflicts and challenges, I think it will help if we can find the sense of passion and call in us that is deeper than our comfort and preferences, and that unites us in our diversity.

This year I also look for some celebrations, as we come back together!

Let me finish with gratitude again. St. Andrew's is a wonderful congregation, and I am so happy to be here with you. I come home from visits with my heart full, in every visit I find reasons to love you, and the more I see this church at work, the more impressed I am. Of course, none of us is perfect. Perfection probably isn't a worthwhile goal anyway. But there is grace here, wisdom, energy, leadership, joy, love, personality, and more. I'm excited to see what God has in store for us in the years to come. Thanks for being part of this!

Board Chair – Lawrence Hrycan

The past year has been one of hope, frustration, belief, asking, moving on, staying the course, and wondering when we are going to get back to some sense of feeling like we can be a community together without causing each other harm.

Despite the existing circumstances in Alberta, Canada, and the World, our church family has managed to pull off some miraculous ways of "bringing us together" and giving us a "sense of belonging" through shared activities that have kept St. Andrew's in a much better place than we could have been. Our teams did not pull the "feel sorry" for us theme but rather presented us with options to get together in the best ways that we could. For that, I feel privileged and grateful to be a part of the St. Andrew's community.

Our Worship Team made the recommendation to the Board that, with the increase and concern about the safety of our congregation members due to the high number of Covid cases in the province and in Alberta, in-person Sunday morning services be put on hold. We started off using a stand-alone camera and uploading services to You Tube. Our Worship and Finance Teams arranged for a Cultural Grant, which was offered to churches, to obtain and install live streaming equipment. In February we were able to offer live streaming. It became so popular, that we had several calls asking that we continue with live streaming even when we went back to full time inperson services. Thank you to the live streaming members of Tristan Maloney, Brendan Simensen, Brielle, Bryna, and Jana Figursky, and Tilly Meyer.

The Worship Team continues to do and be the team in charge of decorating, licensing, working with the ministers and obtaining supply ministers, other personnel for church services, and many other duties which keep us running smoothly.

The Transition Team chaired by Karen Yakimishyn led us through the remainder of the time with Reverend Sarah Fanning and into the Search Team chaired by Claudine Bruning and the ministry of Reverend Dave Holmes. A Covenanting service was held with Dr. Brian Wyatt (from Tennessee), a close friend and colleague of Reverend Dave, sharing stories and helping us to make Dave feel welcome.

The Ministry and Personnel Team (M&P) found us two new members for the church office. Jana Figursky is the Office Coordinator and Shannon Epp is our new Finance person. Karen Yakimishyn and Linda Hueppelsheuser took care of the finances until Shannon was hired. Marg Woodrow, Tilly Meyer, and Susan Hrycan took care of office duties until Jana was hired. Marg Woodrow has also taken on the task of updating our membership list.

Our Living into Right Relations team spearheaded the 'Little Shoes' project in May culminating in the bell ringing on June 9. A Special Service was also organized and led by this fantastic team of individuals.

Several individuals from across all teams met jointly at the Dunnewind farm in the summer to help plan how St. Andrew's could move forward.

The Outreach Team kept us updated with regards to FRoG (Friends of Guatemala) and The Food Grains Project which celebrated 25 years this year. The Affirm Team has a new permanent sign and 5 sessions on the book "Queer Virtues" were offered on-line for anyone interested by Chinook Winds Regional.

Property and Finance worked together to have a fence put up on the west side of the church. This has created a safe space for the Pre-school to enjoy their outdoor activities. Funding came from bottle drives and garage sales held by the Christian Development Team and the Pre-school group, donations from UCW #2, and from the Board.

Lodge services continue to be offered every week. Our Congregational Life and Circles of Care teams try to ensure that emotional and social needs are met.

A reciprocal agreement was reached with the Lacombe Memorial Centre that, in the event of any emergency or cold weather, we could use each other's facilities to muster.

The Christian Development Team arranged for Bell Ringing on Saturday nights to honour those who served unselfishly during the pandemic. An Easter Egg Hunt was held, and a scavenger hunt took place at J.J. Collett in October. Faith at Home Kits for each of the church seasons were made available for anyone interested.

The Men's Breakfast Club has not been meeting for their monthly breakfasts since Covid began. However, some of the men came out to set up and take down the Nativity Scene, and to share some company and coffee afterwards.

During Advent the following took place: Letters and artwork by children for seniors, Phone calls by a team of volunteers, Lift Someone into the Light, A Walk in the Dark, Advent Lighting videos, Food Bank Drive, Santa's Anonymous, Fill a Fridge, Blue Christmas worship service and our annual Christmas Eve service.

We lost some of our friends and family during the year -a time of sadness and reflection. We celebrated weddings, the births of new babies -a time of celebration indeed.

The Board continued to meet both in-person and using Zoom when necessary. Normally, the Board meets 8 or 9 times during the year, taking the summer off. The Board members met all 12 months, sometimes twice a month. Reverend Dave has been leading the Board on a journey of self-reflection with a discussion of the current mission, vision, philosophy, and values of St. Andrew's. This will eventually manifest its way into the congregation.

We have an incredible number of volunteers at St. Andrew's. I just want to say that I am so very grateful for the roles that people have taken on, and St. Andrew's is so much stronger because of you. Even though you are not named, you are forever in our hearts.

THE LEGACY FUND

The Legacy Fund has a current balance of \$64,594 comprised of a chequing account and a series of GICs. It is a "rainy day" fund for future use of St. Andrew's United Church under certain conditions for items of a non-administrative nature.

New donations in 2021 amounted to \$600.00. Thank you to those individuals that provided donations and received a charitable tax receipt.

The investment mandate for the Fund calls for a conservative strategy and interest rates on GICS in Canada are historically very low, so the GICS earned a minimal amount of interest.

Due to the low number of new donations and the low amount of interest earned, no disbursements will be made in 2022 from the Fund, but the small amount of eligible disbursement funds will be carried forward to be compiled with next year's donations and earnings for possible distribution.

Red Deer Presbytery Camps Society operating Kasota East Camp (KEC)

2020-2021 remained painfully quiet with no summer camps for second summer. However, it was a year of exciting projects and site improvements at Kasota East Camp (KEC). In early spring, with continued uncertainty of overnight summer camps, we decided it was the right year for a project that would provide us a tangible goal centred on a summer of fundraising activities in 2021.

Project Pavilion: During a previous (2014) Visioning process, stakeholders identified a new covered kitchen space as one of KEC's 3-year goals to provide more programming and rental space in the absence of Smith Hall. After careful thought, the Board of

Directors decided that 2021 was the right year. Summer 2021 saw Phase 1 of this project, with our new outdoor Pavilion

Summer 2021 saw Phase 1 of this project, with our new outdoor Pavilion successfully erected. It is beautiful new outdoor program space. We all worked hard supporting this project through Bottle Drive Month, Inspiring DIY Fundraiser Campaigns, Donor Tiles Campaign, Paddle for the Pavilion,



Rebel Bean Coffee Campaign, and Snowball Week. This provided our KEC community, supporters and volunteers opportunity to maintain connection to each other and camp, raise awareness of camp and collect funds in support of Project Pavilion.



Phase 2 of this project will improve the function of this space for summer camp programs and activities, as well as for renters. Once completed, this Pavilion will have seasonal running water and electricity, a central fireplace with venting, and roll-down shutters on the doors and windows. If successful with a grant to match funds raised,

we hope to complete Phase 2 in 2022.

Other Site Improvements: Not having camps in session provided us a rare opportunity to complete such programming related site improvements. This coming summer we are so

excited to test out our new Hammock Village and Archery Range Net Posts. Staff cabins were all painted and soffits and facia repaired where needed. Paint and repairs also provided to older cabins. Vesper wood repairs, trees and brush cut and trimmed as required.

Youth Volunteer Squad: Because we were unable to operate camps, KEC offered this free summer leadership opportunity for youth. Each week over the summer, our 4 YVS recruits joined Megan online to learn about leadership, communication, and planning. Together they coordinated a YVS Leadership Retreat, the Tie-Dye T-Shirt Fundraiser, Paddle for the Pavilion, and a mini Camp Cleanup. All 4 recruits plan to apply as volunteer counselors!

Together, we all have the responsibility of stewarding the legacy and the future for offering summer camp programs based on the ethos of the United Church of Canada and teaching the radically inclusive love of Jesus. We still have much work ahead and we need a full Board to support the critical roles and goals we have set for ourselves. Ministry and Personnel (M & P) Committee

As an advisory body, the committee makes recommendations to the church board on ministry and personnel matters. The M & P Committee is represented in the Church Board.

Ministry Staff – Rev. Sarah Fanning's two-year term as an Intentional Interim Pastor ended on June 30, 2021. Sarah's farewell service was on May 23. Rev. Dave Holmes began his ministry with us on May 30. We are looking for someone to join the M & P Committee to represent Dave.

Barbara Lieurance continued in her Pastoral Care role for the equivalent of 1 day per week (20% of fulltime).

Office Staff –Diane Bruce resigned her position of Communications and Community Service Coordinator (CCSC) in June. The office duties were capably carried on by volunteers (Karen Yakimishyn, Marg Woodrow, Sue Hrycan and Tilly Meyer). Jana Figursky was hired (October 1) to fill the CCSC position (25 hours/week). Many thanks to Karen Yakimishyn and Sandra Smith for posting the position, conducting the interviews, and selecting such a capable candidate! We have contracted a bookkeeper, Shannon Epp (5 hours/week) who will commence her duties in January, 2021. We are very thankful for the considerable volunteer effort by Linda Hueppelsheuser to sort out the financial records to prepare for an audit. Also, many thanks to Karen Yakimishyn and Linda Hueppelsheuser for conducting the interviews, and selecting Shannon. Linda will also be involved in familiarizing Shannon with Power Church and is producing a financial procedures reference manual. Thank you, Linda!

Building Custodial & Grounds Keeping – Jill Hair is filling the janitorial position, and the security/custodial contract is with Lee Heindal and Diane Hayduk. The janitorial and custodial contracts were extended for 2022. The grounds keeping contract with Enviromasters is concluded. Norm Start has volunteered to maintain the lawn in the summertime, and snow removal has been contracted with I Care Lawn Service (Terry Souveny).



One of the outcomes of the Transition Team work that took place in 2019- 2021 was the enhancement of the support staff position. Central Alberta Foodgrains Growing Project

Despite the hot temperatures and lack of rainfall, Year 26 turned out to be very successful.

This year, our field was located 10 minutes southeast of Lacombe and we grew 120 acres of canola. We obtained 5,638 bushels from the field and sold it to Richardson Pioneer and received a cheque for \$114,937.

On harvest day, we had 14 farmers/agri-businesses arrive to combine the crop and Vision Truck Lines provided three trucks to haul the crop. It took just over an hour to complete the harvest on a warm late September afternoon.

Previous to harvest date, 4 local farmers swathed the crop to prepare it for harvest.

Immediately prior to combining, GEM Silage Products, Decisive Farming and the Dyck Family provided a lunch for the volunteers and their families.

We had expenses for fertilizer and crop insurance but these were covered by our Sponsor-An-Acre donors through cash donations.

We were able to submit \$120,000 in December to the Canadian Foodgrains Bank in Winnipeg to help with emergency food assistance internationally. These funds will be matched on a 4 to 1 basis by the Federal Government, so our local project raised \$600.000.

A big **Thank-You** to all the farmers, agri-businesses, other local businesses, the landowner, churches, local media and individuals for supporting us in 2021.

We are looking for land in Lacombe County for Year 27. Please conatct Doug Maas at 403-782-1860 for land availability or any questions about the growing project.

Treaty Acknowledgement: We acknowledge that St Andrews United Church resides on land of "Treaty 6". We respect the history, spirituality, and culture of the indigenous peoples with whom the land treaty was signed.

- **National Indigenous Peoples Day** June 21 2020, is a national day of celebration of the heritage, diverse cultures and outstanding achievements of First Nations, Inuit and Métis.
- Indian Residential School children found in unmarked graves all across Canada in 2021. The residential school system harmed Indigenous children significantly by removing them from their families, depriving them of their ancestral languages, and exposing many of them to physical and sexual abuse. After the BC Kamloops discovery of over two hundred graves, St. Andrew's LiRR, placed little shoes on the Churches door step, after 215 hours the bells rang to commemorate them.



• Orange Shirt Day is held yearly on Sep 30th. In 2021 awareness was brought on-line and at schools. Students and many people wore orange shirts with the slogan "Every Child Matters". It is to raise awareness about the residential school system in Canada and the impact it continues to have on Indigenous communities.

The storage room beside the sanctuary got a solid set of stairs now. This is a lot safer for everyone to bring material up to the loft area and back down for use.

The bench outside the main entry doors got renovated.
